## Now is the Time

For this woman from Massachusetts, it's beginning to feel like déjà vu all over again. Change is in the air and I feel a great sense of anticipation. In just a few weeks, the Marriage Equality bill will again be introduced in the Rhode Island General Assembly— but this year is different. We have a Governor-elect who supports civil marriage rights, and many new (and returning) equality legislators in the General Assembly. Now is the time. Rhode Island is poised to make history by passing this critical piece of legislation.

I am reminded of that time in 2004 when I officiated at my first legal same-sex marriage in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. My friends, I can tell you, the earth really did shift beneath my feet. Now I am filled with excitement, looking forward to performing my first legal same sex marriage in Rhode Island.

On Sunday, February 13, UUCSC will hold our second "Re-Inventing Valentine's Day/ Standing on the Side of Love" Rally. We hope to march with other local faith communities in support of Equal Marriage in Rhode Island.

As Unitarian Universalists we have a long and extensive history of support for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender (GLBT) rights. It is important that we all become familiar with that history—we can be proud of it, and be inspired to continue to act on our UU principles, to act for equality.

Here's a bit of UU History:

1970 - General Assembly general resolution to end discrimination against homosexuals and bisexuals, calling on congregations to develop sex education programs that promote healthy attitude toward all forms of sexuality.

1974 - General Assembly business resolution to fund the Office of Gay Concerns.

1984 - General Assembly business resolution affirming the practice of UUA clergy performing services of union for same-gender couples, and requesting that the Department of Ministerial and Congregational Services develop and distribute supporting materials.

1989 - General Assembly resolution to adopt the Welcoming Congregation program to combat homophobia in UU congregations and to educate individual UUs.

1993 - General Assembly Resolution of Immediate Witness supporting the acceptance of openly lesbian, gay and bisexual persons in the United States military.

2004 - UUA President the Reverend William G. Sinkford legally marries Hillary and Julie Goodridge, lead plaintiffs in *Goodridge v. Massachusetts Department of Public Health* in Eliot Hall at the Unitarian Universalist Association.

2010 - 650 UUA congregations in the United States are Welcoming Congregations.

For more than forty years, UUs have supported GLBT rights. May we wear our heritage with honor and pride and support equal marriage in Rhode Island. Now is the time, and we are the people to make heard.

The President's December 12, 2010 "Chalice-Side Chat"

Dear members and friends, today I want to speak with you about governance: specifically governance of our beloved congregation. As many of you know, our minister Betty Kornitzer will be going on a well-deserved one month sabbatical next month and for four months next year. When Betty was called to be our minister seven years ago she became the UUCSC's first minister to live in South County and eventually she also became our first

full-time staff person. As such Betty became a "catch all" for all issues affecting our congregation. Being the one person who had the "bird's eye" view of the congregation, she was the person everyone went to. If a light was out, or a there was a death, Betty was the person to talk to. Presidents and Boards come and go but Betty is a constant. The situation is even more pronounced because we don't have an office administrator.

The amazing job of fundraising and construction in a very short time took much of our time and attention. However, we are entering into our next phase in the life of our congregation— ownership of a building and all the joys and concerns associated with it. We need to free up Betty to do what she was called to do: be the spiritual leader of our congregation. She needs to concentrate on preparing Sunday services, providing pastoral care, running workshops (when she can) and doing other spiritually directed activities.

The Board, and I as the President, need to become more visible and accessible. I plan to give more Chalice-Side Chats. Photos of each Board member and their committees will soon be put up in the community room. One of my priorities this year is to make sure that there are strong Board liaisons to each committee. A Congregational Handbook is being worked on and the initial draft should be completed very shortly.

### MONEY MATTERS The monthly column from the Finance Committee

During the past few months, the Finance Committee has been addressing some of the concerns you voiced at the Cottage Meetings that were held last year. We are using the 2010 Comprehensive Evaluation of Our Shared Ministry as our guide. We have been focusing on "what things cost" and have taken you through Facilities and Staff expenses. This month the budget expense items we are looking at are Administration and Denominational Contributions.

Administration includes the following:

As you see, these numbers are from the end of November. The December figures are not available at this printing.

Denominational Contributions include the following:

Most of you know that we are asked each year to donate a certain amount of money per congregation member. This is approximately \$73 per member this year. The UUCSC has given 100% of the Fair Share requested each year it has been in existence. Each of the UU churches are asked to do the same.

## The Agape Fund

In the New Testament, "agape" refers to God's fatherly love for all humans, as well as their reciprocal love for God, a concept that necessarily extends to love for all of one's fellow humans. To early Christians, the word meant both a rite and a meal of fellowship to which the poor were invited. Some scholars believe agape referred to a fellowship meal held in imitation of gatherings attended by Jesus and his disciples.



The UUCSC's Agape Fund was created to provide confidential help to members and friends of the congregation who are having difficulty meeting the the cost of basic needs such as food, shelter, and heat. The basis of the fund is the collection taken at the annual Christmas Eve Eve service.

Rev. Betty Kornitzer administers this fund. This month, during her absence, congregation president Charlie Donnelly is in charge of it.

## No room at the inn . . . but we can help

This issue was presented to the congregation at the Christmas Eve Eve service, but it continues to demand attention.

According to a recent census on homelessness, Rhode Island is about 200 beds short of the number needed to accommodate the homeless population. It has gotten to the point that current



shelters must turn people away at night. It is COLD outside and it will only get worse in the weeks ahead. And did you know that according to a recent report published by the R.I. Coalition for the Homeless, more than half of those living in shelters—53 percent—are new to homelessness? Forty percent are families and 27 percent are children.

The Roman Catholic diocese has given the Coalition use of a vacant building that can accommodate 40 beds. However, money is needed to pay for staff and other expenses. Approximately \$200,000 will be needed to open and operate five planned emergency shelters.

While emergency and short-term shelters are not the answer to the state's homeless problem, it is a needed fix for the cold winter months. We are asking the state's faith communities to help raise the needed funds to keep people out of the cold during our winter nights.

The UUCSC Social Justice Council has voted to allocate \$300 (of its available \$400) to this cause and to ask individuals in the congregation to make a personal donation. Donations can be left in the special collection box after Sunday services, or made directly to the Coalition for the Homeless's Winter Shelter Fund at http://www.rihomeless.org/ or 1070 Main Street, Pawtucket, RI 02860. (Write "Winter Shelter Fund" on the memo line of your check.) There is much more that needs to be done. — John Glasheen

### Social Justice Council reshapes its strategic plan

The Social Justice Council met on December 8 to reshape its strategic plan. The mission was revised as follows:

The Social Action mission is to be strong voice for social justice for South County and Rhode Island and to be recognized by the community for our efforts. We strive to educate and promote community and public discourse about moral values and civic virtues, to witness and advocate for social and economic justice, to touch peoples' lives in an uplifting manner, to minister to the earth, and to move persons to choose to take action. The Social Justice Council will serve as a catalyst for individuals and families to participate in these value-driven, pro-social behaviors. We seek to follow the best practices of UU history and present UUA reality and direction. We seek to follow the dictum of St. Francis: "Preach the gospel; if necessary, use words." To increase involvement, we will publicize potential opportunities, facilitate individual and family participation, and honor noteworthy contributions to our immediate and

broader community.

The strategic plan will shortly be submitted to the Board for incorporation.

We also discussed Standing on the Side of Love, with an intention to organize for full participation locally and state-wide on same sex marriage and pro-immigration efforts, the latter in concert with Common Ground. With a new Governor who supports same-sex marriage, there is strong hope to pass legislation this year. A major effort will be organized to rally following the February 13th service. It is particularly important for straight couples to write letters in support of marriage equality to District 35 Representative-elect Spencer Dickinson (422B South Road, Wakefield 02879). All are encouraged to contact John Glasheen to participate.

The Council also reviewed, discussed and unanimously passed a resolution to the Board to modify our budget calculations and reporting. As noted in John's sermon on December 12, the congregation appears to have little interest in providing financial support to worthy causes in the community. However, the Council noted that for 2009-2010, there was an additional \$12,320 spent by the congregation to support our Social Action efforts, a much more credible effort towards the community. We will be sending to the Board a "friendly amendment to the way we think about our annual budget" to encourage a broader reference to actual congregational expenditure. — John Glasheen
