

As I reflect upon the life and culture of our congregation, I recognize that our Unitarian Universalist identity could us some reinforcement. At General Assembly in June, more than 4,000 Unitarian Universalists celebrated the 50th anniversary of our merged association, the UUA. UU identity, history and present mission were emphasized in dozens of venues every day. It was inspiring and rewarding. I am excited to envision the renewed energy and enthusiasm that can grow out of a deeper sense of our UU identity.

I plan to use much of my Ministerial Study Leave to plan programming that will ask the question: "R U A UU?" This will offer us opportunities to reflect upon what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist today.

My summer reading suggestion for us all is to do a careful reading of the Summer 2011 issue of UU World, the UUA's magazine. John Glasheen started a UU World discussion group this year. I hope that group will continue with increased participation.

## General Assembly 2011 was a great experience

From June 22 through June 26, about four thousand Unitarian Universalists descended on Charlotte, North Carolina for the 50th anniversary UUA General Assembly. About 2,000 of those UUs were delegates—and I was one of them.

The opening ceremony was moving, with music and a parade of banners from each congregation.

It was difficult to decide which events to go to. Every one I went to meant several I could not attend.

The events fell into some major categories: programs, including speeches by important figures; workshops; worship services; evening programs, often films; and plenary sessions, which are business meetings with voting on major issues.

Rev. William Schulz's presentation, "Changing the World: What Works and What Doesn't," drew a large crowd. He is the current president of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee, a past UUA president, and past executive director of Amnesty International. He listed four reasons protest movements succeed: They have an identifiable adversary, a simple clear cut message or slogan, they operate on more than one level, and they recognize the true nature of power and how to approach it. Without one or more of these, a movement can fail.

David Bacon is an award-winning journalist and the author of *Illegal People: How Globalization Creates Migration and Criminalizes Immigrants*. (I bought a copy). His talk, "Immigration as a Moral Issue," covered the human cost paid by migrants in Arizona, such as jail and family separations. He also covered the powerful influence of American corporations on the Mexican government and the harm they cause to the Mexican economy.

At each General Assembly, a distinguished guest is invited to deliver the Ware Lecture. The lectures began with one of the UUA's predecessor organizations, the American Unitarian Association, in 1922 as a result of a bequest from the Ware family of Milton, Mass. Ware Lecturers have included Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in 1966.

On Saturday evening, June 25, Karen Armstrong delivered the Ware lecture. She is a celebrated commentator on religious matters and is a best-selling author of several books. Her talk was about the subject of her latest book: "Twelve Steps to a More Compassionate Life." A few of the steps: learn about compassion, empathy, and mindfulness; have concern for everybody; and love your enemies. She pointed out that the Golden Rule, first formulated by Confucius around 500 B.C., has been central to all the major faiths. Her book was available for purchase and I bought a copy.

There is a lot of enthusiasm and excitement about the GA, and rightly so. It is a wonderful experience

because one meets so many great people and the programs provide one with so much food for thought about ethical issues and social problems.

## **Our New Ministry Model**

At the June UUCSC Annual Meeting, the congregation approved the following motion made by the Committee on Ministry:

While the By-Laws of the Congregation do not require a vote of the members for the Minister and Board of Directors to enter into a contract providing that the Minister reduce her time to 75% and be paid 75% of her fulltime salary, the Committee on Ministry believes that it would be in the best interest of the Congregation to ask for a vote on the proposal for Reverend Betty Kornitzer to reduce her time. Therefore, I make a motion that the Congregation accept the proposal that Reverend Betty Kornitzer's contract commencing July 1, 2011 provide that she will serve the Congregation at 75% of full-time at 75% of her full-time salary. If the motion does not pass, Rev. Betty will continue to serve the Congregation on a full-time basis.

The 25% reduction in the minister's salary releases funds to hire UUCSC's first office administrator. (Hooray!). A search committee has been formed and hopes to hire an administrator to begin work by the last week in August. – Betty Kornitzer

## Justice GA: The 2012 Phoenix General Assembly



Next year's UUA General Assembly will be held in Phoenix. The site was chosen long before Arizona legislators enacted a law that empowers police officers to check the citizenship status of anyone they stop. Many people believe that law will encourage police to stop people based on their appearance instead of on whether they are suspected of committing a crime, and that the risk of unjust deportations will increase. Many people advocated boycotting Arizona, and the UUA Board of Trustees called for the UUA to boycott Arizona as well. Delegates at the 2010 General Assembly in Minneapolis, however, passed a resolution dedicating the 2012 GA to "witnessing on immigration, racial, and economic justice," and limiting business items to the minimum required by the bylaws so that delegates could spend their time discussing and acting on those issues.

### To Our Congregation:

I sent this letter to the UUA General Assembly Planning Committee. The focus of next year's GA will be the treatment of immigrants in Arizona. UU members have protested in Arizona already, and plan a much larger demonstration next year, I believe. What sparked me to write this letter was a remark by someone on stage at this year's GA that was

unnecessarily confrontational, I believe. The speaker considered the police to be an adversary. I had just been exposed to discussions of fundamental moral principles common to the major religions, including UU. I decided we ought to apply those principles and seek to talk with the police, hence the letter. It may make us a bit safer out there.  $-Larry\ Kelland$ 

### Dear Members of the Planning Committee:

I think we should invite the Phoenix Police to give a presentation at our convention, so we hear their side, OR have them as part of a panel discussion.

I think it would actually make us safer at the GA, because we are reaching out to them, instead of considering them to be an enemy (which is not the UU way).

We also need to somehow get across the fact that it is large U.S. corporations who are in essence PUSHING the immigrants north by undercutting their livelihood. Then we ask for a more humane treatment of the immigrants.

I have heard the attitude expressed, at our conference: "You think you had a demo! Just wait until you see the next one!" That is too aggressive. I am not saying don't demonstrate. We need to reason together with the police if they are willing to talk to us. Of course, they may reject the offer, but at least we made an offer and reached out.
