On Sunday, February 21, congregation member Steve Harrison delivered a stirring sermon based on the words we speak every Sunday: "Love is the spirit of this congregation." The teas have benefitted the Girl Scouts of Rhode Island, Big Sisters of Rhode Island, Hurricane Katrina relief, and others organizations and causes. Locations have included Blithewold, Silver Lake Cottage, the State House, the Radisson Airport Hotel, and Eclectibles Café.

This year, for the second year in a row, the tea to benefit the Jonnycake Center in Peace Dale (now in its fifth year) will take place at UUCSC on Saturday, April 17th from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. Besides tea

sandwiches, pastries, goodies and baskets, we will feature a "green" fashion show by Chameleons Consignments of Wakefield. North Kingstown musician Dawn Chung will provide live piano music. You are welcome to wear your favorite hat!



During these difficult economic times, there is no nonprofit organization in our community that needs our help more than the Jonnycake Center. As of December 2009, the center had 1,546 client households (466 new households were registered in 2009) and a total of 3,839 clients. Some 513 of those households received Thanksgiving food baskets in November.

The monthly column from the Finance Committee

As many of you may already know, we purchased Unit B with office space on the second floor of our building. The unit has been rented to the East Coast Greenway Alliance, but the Greenway will soon be leaving us. Its board has hired a new director and moved the operation to New York. An office and storage closet are still being rented to the Greenway until it leaves Rhode Island completely. We anticipate this to happen within a few months.

During the past few weeks, Carolyn Hurdis has spearheaded a crew that painted and cleaned the space. She has also had Mr. Luster Klean come in to give the carpeting a spruce up and repair. (Thank you Carolyn and her wonderful crew!)

We have retained Keith Munroe of Munroe Realtors to advertise and show the space.

So what are we offering?

The space is approximately 1,145 sq. ft. and consists of four offices with windows that have a view out to the pond, a large room that can be used as a conference room, two storage rooms, a foyer that can be used as a waiting room, and a small bathroom.

It is a quiet, bright working space that can be rented by one business or by several people who wish to share the conference room, waiting room and storage areas.

We anticipate offering the space for a rental price that will be extremely competitive. The rent will include all utilities except telephone and internet connection.

While the space is not handicap accessible, it would be very attractive to anyone who does not need an elevator.

## We Are Fleeing Pharaoh's Army (A Reenactment of the First Seder)

At sunset on the first day of Pesach (Passover),\* all slaves are invited to throw off the yoke of Pharaoh's bondage and escape to freedom. We will meet in a secret encampment on the banks of the Saugatucket, perform the time-honored rituals of purification, and prepare for the pilgrimage to freedom.

A commemorative feast of strictly kosher foods will follow. This service is interactive and intergenerational. Participants are requested to dress in the clothes they would wear if preparing to flee on foot through the wilderness to freedom.

Participants are invited to carefully consider what items and possessions they would bring with them if they were actually fleeing on foot to freedom. A written list is sufficient but you may bring actual items if so moved.

Since the Egyptian authorities strictly forbid escaping from slavery, this event must be conducted in absolute secrecy. Those wishing to be free should contact Rich Evans for the location and the password needed to be admitted.

Offerings for the kosher banquet will be coordinated when reservations are made. We are seeking actors, actresses, musicians and performers of rituals, particularly those who are familiar with the Hebrew language and the traditions of the Seder. As always, we will need volunteers to help set up, serve, and clean up.

## UUCSC is Standing on the Side of Love

About eighty members and friends of UUCSC spent part of their Valentine's Day afternoon Standing on the Side of Love by marching to Wakefield and rallying at Dale Carlia Corner.

As the closing circle formed at the end of the Valentine's Day service, an audible gasp of excitement went up as the children came in with many bright and colorful signs and pictures for the march and rally. As the closing circle formed at pants, singing and holding signs, proclaimed "WE ARE STANDING ON THE SIDE OF LOVE to the passing traffic and pedestrians, as about thirty more participants who drove to the site joined the rally.

During the service, Rev. Betty Kornitzer helped us understand was "standing" means. "Trying to" is not standing, "thinking about" is not standing, and "talking about" is not standing. Only STANDING is standing!

About fifty adults, youth and children gathered opposite the Peace Dale Library at 11:30 and marched together to Dale Carlia Corner in Wakefield. (Meanwhile, six adults with shovels and hatchets drove to the corner to clear the snow and ice off the sidewalk at the rally site, a necessity of the day.) By the time the marchers arrived, a sufficient area was cleared, and the participants, singing and holding signs, proclaimed "WE ARE STANDING ON THE SIDE OF LOVE to the passing traffic and pedestrians, as about thirty more participants who drove to the site joined the rally.

For the next thirty minutes, the crowd—ranging from toddlers to folks in their 70s, and one woman days away from giving birth—filled both sides of the intersection with their colorful signs. Many spectators cheered and shouted out of car windows.

The rally was reported in the South County Independent and by http://www.standingonthesideoflove.org/, the website for "Standing on the Side of Love,"(the UUA campaign launched last summer to harness love's power to stop oppression) as one of more than a hundred such rallies around the world.

That website includes a link to Erin Barrette Goodman's website (http://eringoodman.com). Erin's blog includes a report on the march and rally. An excerpt:

While we marched I asked Lily what the rally was all about.

"It's about spreading love, Mama. And brightening people's days. And being kind to each other. That's what Valentine's Day is all about."

What more could be said? A great bonding experience for the congregation and a wonderful statement to our larger community. It's not trying, it is not thinking, it is not talking; it is standing!
