The Minister's Message

Sabbatical Reveries

Sabbatical was a true gift and I thank the congregation from the bottom of my heart. I return to South County refreshed and renewed, and, as always, happy to be with you.

January in Southern California was definitely an excellent idea. I arrived several weeks after the mud slides and one week after the cold spell. The average daytime weather during my stay was about 75 degrees, not too hard to take. While the weather was lovely, it was the sabbatical experience itself that made the month so significant.

First, the four-day Poetry Circle experience: You may have noticed that I am very drawn to poetry. You usually hear a poem or two at the Sunday morning service. I find that poetry moves the spirit much the way music does. Poetry prepares the soil of my heart and mind to receive seeds of sentiment, knowledge and understanding. It is often through poetry that I connect most profoundly with myself and the world around me. I have appreciated poetry for a long time. This year I have begun to write it. The Poetry Circle I worked with in San Diego was a facilitated group of five aspiring poets. We practiced the art of poetry together with critique and editing sessions. I am now working with a poetry coach here in Rhode Island.

I spent four days working with my Spiritual Director in La Mesa. I have worked weekly with this person by telephone for the past thirteen years. During this time I did personal spiritual work, and I also received training in doing spiritual direction with others.

My time in California was capped with two weeks in the high chaparrals at Deer Park Monastery in Escondido, Thich Nhat Hahn's retreat center. This was a time of personal reflection and study of Thich Nhat Hahn's teachings in Buddhism,.

Here's a brief Poem from Deer Park:

Dawning Walk at Deer Park Monastery

The red boulders rise, statuesque, from the mountainside, Elders greeting me at the gates to Enlightenment. Here, the heavens are so bright and close, I find I am walking in the blueness of the sky, Not beneath it. Everything is clear and intense, Within and without. All senses are heightened as Sage and rosemary permeate The bone dry air.

This is a Technicolor walk, Everything is illuminated, And I think to myself: Maybe this is how it begins, Here on this mountain ridge, Among the boulders, the coyotes, the sage and rosemary enlightenment, I mean.

However, the Board approved an Ad-Hoc Handbook Committee at its February meeting. Marcia is the chair; additional members include Linda Whyte Burrell (Board Vice President), Rich Evans (Trustee), and Peter Himmel. The committee will develop a Committee Handbook, "Who Do I . . . ?" (a guide for friends and members), a Policies and Procedures Handbook, and a Board Book. The Committee will make a preliminary report at the

Board's April meeting. The goal is to produce the four documents to be considered at the May Board Meeting, and to be presented at the Congregation Annual Meeting on June 6.

The Committee will also provide a list of topics not covered yet by the materials but to be included in the future. The Policies and Procedures Handbook will outline a clear process to update and review these four documents on an ongoing basis (at least annually).

The Committee will participate in forums or other methods of communication within the congregation as the Board requests to facilitate the process of developing these documents and introducing them for ongoing use by the UUCSC. These four documents will be maintained and updated on the UUCSC website and three paper copies will be available in the church office.

The ad-hoc committee will end as of June 30, 2011. Yeah!

I love that last line, "Believing in the equality of all that lives." To my mind, you have to believe it first and then act on it, work for it and teach it to our children and youth with lots of love and rich experiences.

Our children and youth definitely have hands-on experiences with that concept. Our Coming of Age Youth, along with their advisors, attended the Standing on the Side of Love Service on February 13, and both the Coming of Age youth and most of the Senior Youth Group attended the rally that followed. What a powerful experience for this community to share with our teens!

The elementary-level children have also been exploring diversity and helping our fellow human beings through projects such as making a huge batch of minestrone soup for our friends at Welcome House, and making greeting cards to send to various friends and members of the congregation who could use a smile. The Junior Youth Group will also gather this month and make a feast for Welcome House.

The upper elementary children have created a "Just Town," deciding as a group what would be useful and important in such a town, how to keep a small environmental footprint, and how to make these decisions as a team.

Many of our senior youth attended the Cons (Conferences) at Westminster Unitarian Church in East Greenwich and had an absolutely great time meeting other UU teens from various congregations.

Rally for Marriage Equality draws huge crowd

Building on its success a year ago, the UUCSC's annual Standing on the Side of Love Rally on February 13th, in support of pending marriage equality legislation, drew more than one hundred participants, including members of other local churches, local legislators, and representatives of Marriage Equality R.I Kingstown Patch" (http://southkingstown.patch.com -(MERI).

Instead of marching to Dale Carlia Corner, we rallied at the church from 11:45 a.m. to 1 p.m. this year because of the weather conditions. Incredibly effective presentations were made by eight people directly affected by our present laws, clearly underscoring the need to pass the legislation. Kathy Kushnir, director of MERI, Carolyn Mark of the R.I. National Organization for Women, and Rev. Betty Kornitzer made brief presentations. South Kingstown's representatives in the legislature were invited; Senator Sosnowski and representatives Walsh, Tanzi, and Dickinson attended and spoke, as did Representative Frank Ferri of

Warwick, one of the prime sponsors of the legislation in the House.

We received media coverage from the Narragansett Times, the South County Independent, which estimated the crowd at 100 to 130, and the on-line "South

End of Life Planning Workshop Sunday, March 13 and Sunday, March 27

Presenters: Rev. Betty Kornitzer, Lou Rubenstein, M.D., medical director of the Hospitalist program at South County Hospital (on March 13 only), and Marcia J. Boyd, an attorney in private practice concentrating in elder law, probate and trusts, and related areas.

This two-session workshop is valuable for people of all ages, including young adults. Attending both sessions is valuable but not required. At the March 13th session, we will discuss the medical, pastoral and legal elements of the planning process, including end-of-life planning and medical decisions, and durable powers of attorney for health care and living wills. We will use the "Five Wishes" material provided by Aging with Dignity and recommended by the American Bar Association.

On March 26, we will discuss general durable powers of attorney, the importance of having a last will and testament, and what Rhode Island law says about advance funeral planning. Participants will be able to review and sign documents to confirm their end-of-life decisions.

How to Lose 5,000 lbs. a Month
