But two people fighting back to back can cut through a mob, a snake-dancing file can break a cordon, an army can meet an army.

Two people can keep each other sane, can give support, conviction, love, massage, hope, sex.
Three people are a delegation, a committee, a wedge. With four you can play bridge and start an organization. With six

you can rent a whole house,
eat pie for dinner with no
seconds, and hold a fund raising party.
A dozen makes a demonstration.
A hundred fill a hall.
A thousand have solidarity
and your own newsletter;
ten thousand, power and your own paper;
a hundred thousand, your own media;
ten million, your own country.

It goes on one at a time, It starts when you care to act, it starts when you do it again after they said no, it starts when you say We and know who you mean, and each day you mean one more.

May we at UUCSC remember always who we are as Unitarian Universalists and why we are here. There is an inner mission and there is an outer mission. We need community for both.


We are seeking volunteers to bake, make soup, host and serve, and make a sign for our street entrance. If you are interested, contact Rich Evans. – *Rich Evans*

Spiritual Deepening: A Continuing Series for Unfolding a Soulful Life

This monthly series for experiencing and deepening our spiritual lives, facilitated by Christine Phoenix-Green and Rev. Betty Kornitzer, meets on the third Wednesday of each month from 7 to 8:45 p.m. in the Sanctuary. We will explore new ways of living authentically from the center of our depths, where peace and wisdom reside.

The method we use is validated by substantial clinical research done in major hospitals including the Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston and Kaiser Permanente in California. Halloween is upon us and this year it falls on a Sunday! All (adults too) are encouraged to come dressed up in costume. I've already got my costume . . .

Some Important Notes:

- Babies and toddlers should begin upstairs with their families at the beginning of service and then proceeded downstairs with the Sunday school groups.
- The children and youth begin and stay *downstairs* on the first Sunday of each month. This is a time of allages worship for the elementary-age classes.
- Please encourage your child to leave toys behind when entering the classrooms.

Once you take a box home, there are clear and easy instructions to follow. The International Institute also offers the opportunity to sponsor a refugee family. As a sponsor, our congregation would help the family adjust to life in the United States. If we are going to participate in this program, we need someone to organize it Are you that person? If you are interested in finding out more about this, please let us know!

Each year Common Ground offers a Sunday service called Journey Toward Wholeness that focuses on some aspect of our ongoing efforts to grow in awareness and overcome racism. Food Sovereignty and Social Justice

On Wednesday, October 13, Witness for Peace New England presents Kiado Cruz, a community organizer from Oaxaca, Mexico. Cruz represents RASA (La Red Autónoma por la Soberanía

Alimentaria—The Autonomous Network for Food Sovereignty). He will speak about sustainable agriculture in Oaxaca City and the organizing there that centers on safe, abundant, and local food for all.

Cruz will visit community gardens in our area and speak with the local press. His talk on October 13 will explain how the creation of local food systems and local economies is taking place south of our border as a response to the global food system that has created widespread hunger in Mexico. Cruz also will field questions about education reform, immigration reform, and promoting fair and just international trade, both in Latin America and in the U.S.

The talk is co-sponsored by the community of St. Augustine's Episcopal Church in Kingston and the membership of UUCSC. The talk is at 7 p.m., and a potluck dinner will take place before the talk at 6 p.m. Please come break bread with our Oaxacan friend, support his work, listen and learn. We hope to see you there!

The Social Justice Council will meet on Wednesday, Oct. 13 from 7 to 8:30 p.m. in the Community Room.

This organizational meeting will focus on:

- 1. Articulating and elaborating program operations for effectivess and impact
- 2. Developing an education program, including sermons, on the elements of our social action program and its theological basis
- 3. How we can encourage the congregation to become spiritually mature—to have the courage to act on our principles as an act of a faith community rather than individually.
- 4. Promoting actions to follow from programs, education, and development activities
- 5. Increasing awareness of UUA as a denomination,

including its development, programs and its growth policy.

6. Discussing the effectiveness of recent activities and programs

To further a denominational perspective and to increase focus on UUA actions and activities, an educational program with UU World as the source will begin on Monday, October 18th in the Community Room. All members and friends are invited to a potluck dinner and discussion. This meeting will take place about five weeks after the fall edition of UU World is published. We will prioritize our interest in the articles and discussion will focus on the topics of greatest interest.
