The Minister's Message

"A Peace Communion on September 11? What about a Water Communion?"

September 11 is our ingathering Sunday service. At UUCSC, ingathering is almost synonymous with Water Communion Sunday. As in past years, we've all been gathering water from various summer outings to share on "opening day." This year, however, is a little different. This year September 11th marks the 10th anniversary of 9/11, a day that changed the way we live and move and have our being in the world.

I believe it is important for UUCSC to find a distinctively Unitarian Universalist way to recognize and honor this important anniversary. The late Unitarian Universalist minister Rev. Forrest Church edited a book responding to the terror of 9/11 called *Restoring Faith: America's Religious Leaders Answer Terror With Hope.* I believe the truest hope for our world lies in creating peace. Hence I have decided that on 9/11/11, we will celebrate a "Peace Communion" at our ingathering service. This will be a positive and uplifting time. Bring your water, please. We will mingle our waters as part of our Peace Communion. This is an *intergenerational* service, and we've planned it be family friendly, with special roles for the children.

Peace and compassion are vital UU principles, as expressed in the Statement of Conscience on Peacemaking, ratified at the 2010 UUA General Assembly. The Statement affirms our belief in the transforming power of Love. It reads in part:

We believe all people share a moral responsibility to create peace. Mindful of both our rich heritage and our past failures to prevent war, and enriched by our present diversity of experience and perspective, we commit ourselves to a radically inclusive and transformative approach to peace. Our commitment to creating peace calls us to the work of peace building, peacemaking and peacekeeping.

While rituals such as Water Communion are a vital part of congregational life, we are also called to respond to evens in the wider community. After the service, all will be invited to sign a Charter of Compassion as a way of Peace Making. Our Universalist faith in the oneness of the whole human family teaches us that peace is necessary; our Unitarian faith in the sacred potential of each person teaches us that peace is possible. Our Peace Communion affirms our theological roots. I hope you will join us.

Our relationship with Welcome House

The UUCSC has had a long relationship with Welcome House, South Kingstown's homeless shelter and our neighbor in Peace Dale. We have shared the contributions in our collection plate, we have raised money in the annual Good Friday Walk for Shelter, and we have collected and distributed tooth brushes, toothpaste, and other personal care items to Welcome House residents.



For a number of years, we also have been one of the local congregations who prepare a monthly meal for Welcome House. On the second Wednesday of each month, we provide a salad, an entree, and a dessert for twenty people. Members and friends sign up

to take responsibility for all or part of a meal. Sometimes two families get together and prepare it. Our youth groups also have cooked the meal and delivered it. Those of us with limited cooking skills have delivered the ingredients to Welcome House and the residents have prepared the meal. It's up to you to choose what works for you. We do ask that you make sure the meal arrives at Welcome House by 5 p.m.

MONEY MATTERS

The monthly column from the Finance Committee

Because I am a former teacher, September always feels like the beginning of a new year to me. This is true for our Finance Committee as well. We are looking at our financial situation with fresh eyes and great enthusiasm.

As you heard at the annual congregational meeting this past June, we face a challenging financial picture. This wonderful new home of ours has a few major repairs that must be attended to this year. The cost to us will be in the vicinity of \$20,000. In order to pay for the work, we are dipping into the Land & Building Fund. This fund has been providing the income necessary to balance our budget at the end of each fiscal year. In addition to the Land & Building Fund, we also have a trust fund started with a \$75,000 gift we received in 2007. Both these funds have provided the limited time income necessary for our operating expenses since we bought the building. They are exactly that— *limited time* income sources. The trust fund runs out in two years. With our added expense for repairs this year, we estimate that we will use the balance of the Land & Building Fund by June of 2013.

So we have this coming year, until June 2013, to develop and implement a plan to increase income to cover our costs without the use of these two supplemental funds. It will be a challenge, but this Congregation has always been up for a challenge—all we have to hear is, "It can't be done." We have proved the experts wrong every time. This is another of these moments to shine and to change the direction toward fiscal health.

Both the Board of Directors and the Finance Committee will be working together during the coming months to arrive at a viable plan. We do this together. We all will have a part in the solution. Everyone.

Welcome House needs our help

Because of limited attendance at our Social Justice Council meeting on August 16, most of the planned discussion was deferred to the next meeting on Wednesday, October 12.

We did decide that Welcome House should receive the proceeds from the Share the Plate program in September because of the their financial crisis. We received this message from Clay Berry, Welcome House Board President:

With all my heart I wish it didn't have to come to this, but I am writing to make an emergency plea for help. Welcome House of South County is facing a short-term financial crisis that could do serious harm to the agency. . . The long term financial picture for the agency actually looks rather good. However, both state and federal funds have been delayed and private donations have been down for a while. With the economy in such poor condition, and with the costs of maintaining the agency always on the rise, a perfect storm of sorts has hit the agency . . . Your support for the work we do in this community has been invaluable in the past, and critical now. Please consider making an emergency donation so that the work we can continue unhindered.

Linda Barden, Welcome House director, told us she prefers to receive help in September. So that is our recommendation.

Small Group Ministry at UUCSC

Come to the October 2nd Sunday service and attend the sample Small Group workshop after the service.

Small Group Ministry is a way for people to build connections within our growing congregation. The groups create an environment in which we can come together to talk about the significant events of our lives and

about the ideas that engage us. Groups of between six and ten people are inclusive, not exclusive. They are not therapy groups, affinity groups, or study groups.



When people are asked why they come to church, the most common reasons given are to be part of a religious community, for inspiration and intellectual stimulation, to meet people and to find support for their spiritual journey. Small Group Ministry fills these needs and seeks to address the social isolation and superficiality so characteristic of modern life. It is a response to the deep hunger in our hearts for real connection with each other and for spiritual

exploration and growth.

How does Small Group Ministry work? Groups of six to ten people covenant to meet regularly every two weeks for an hour and a half to two hours. Each meeting begins and ends with a reading. There is a brief "check-in" at the beginning during which participants can say a little about what's new or important in their lives, and there's a feedback time at the end of the discussion. The main part of the meeting is a discussion of a topic selected by the group from a wide range of choices. Some recent topics include aging, approval, atheism, caring, change, democracy, forgiveness, friendship, 'Is anything sacred?,' living simply, longing, and perfection.

How do you join a Small Group? We form new Small Groups in October and February. At those times there is an orientation workshop (this year it's October 2) for interested congregants, and an opportunity to sign up to join a group. You can join a Small Group at any time by speaking with Rev. Betty Kornitzer, who will explain the program and assign you to a group. Call her at 284-3321, the minister's study, to make arrangements.

Thinking about our UU identity in theological terms and reflecting on the 2011 General Assembly

Larry Kelland gave us a good report on the 2011 UUA General Assembly in the July-August issue of *The South County Unitarian Universalist*. I would like to emphasize newer directions and policies that may challenge and inspire our congregational culture.

Before the 2010 General Assembly, the UUA Trustees decided as a protest of Arizona's anti-illegal immigration law to join the boycott of Arizona and move the 2012 GA away from Phoenix, where it had been scheduled to take place. But newly-elected UUA President Rev. Peter Morales inspired and persuaded the delegates to go to Phoenix and conduct a "Protest General Assembly," collaborating with local groups to discuss and act on immigration, racial, and economic justice issues.

At the 2011 General Assembly, the theme continued to be change, on both the national and the congregational levels. At his workshop, Rev. Morales invoked three imperatives:

We must get religion; we must practice commonality, not just spiri-

tuality.

We must trust our leaders as acts of love.

We must cross borders of class and culture.



Other speakers repeated these themes. Rev. Galen Guengerich said, "Our purpose is to awaken our sense of the sacred and renew our resolve to transform ourselves and our world. The liberal tradition in theology insists that religion is not mainly a set of beliefs; it is a way of life. Religion is the collection of external forms that constitute this way of life: sacred spaces where we find refuge, music to gladden our spirit, stories to restore our courage, symbols to remind us of commitments we have made and daily rituals that renew our resolve. In this sense, if we are to be truly spiritual as individuals, we must become religious."

Professor Karen Armstrong, presenting the annual Ware Lecture, said, "And yet it seems to me quite clear that unless we now learn to implement the Golden Rule globally so that we treat all peoples, all nations, as we would wish to be treated ourselves, we're not going to have a viable world. This is the task of our time, to build a global community where people of all persuasions can live together in harmony and respect."

To emphasize the importance of this theme, Rev. Betty Kornitzer plans a collaborative sermon on General Assembly for September 25. A forum called "What is our UU identity: UU Theology from GA 2011," immediately after the service from 11:30 to 12:30, will reinforce that effort. Some reading material related to the topic will be distributed to everyone in the congregation before September 25.

This is an exciting opportunity to share thinking about our UU identity in theological terms!

One Year On: Reflections on 'Music at Lily Pads'

Our September 10th concert marks the one-year anniversary of the Music at Lily Pads concert series. It seems a good time to look at the series evolution, direction, and how its objectives relate to UUCSC's mission.

Last year, in a brainstorming session after service, several people shared ideas about how the church

might increase revenues during these tenuous times. We discussed using the sanctuary as other Unitarian congregations use theirs, for special concerts and other coffeehouse programs. The idea of using the sanctuary as a performance space was not new, as Harry Buffum and Nick Smith already had been producing marvelous local events at Lily Pads and at UUCSC's former residence. What

was new was the idea of bringing in national talent, and continuing with innovative local programs. We contacted various national booking agencies, and tested the waters with a Rhode Island-based show featuring Brown Bird and Fly Around. Everyone had a great time, and we learned a lot. We bought used PA equipment and presented our first show featuring out-of-state talent, Anais Mitchell and Horse Feathers, in November.

Our successes include the sellout show with The Low Anthem and Joe Fletcher in January, our wonderful local shows with Nick Smith and The Repercussions, and our potluck dinner concerts with Saddle Up the Chicken, the KC Moaners, and Jim Page and Joyce Katzberg. The latter represented a great collaboration between the Social Events committee and Common Ground. Red Molly in April was a very special night. Many members and friends of UUCSC attend this event. Vance Gilbert in June was a great evening artistically, but was not exactly a box-office smash. Finally, our children's concert in August with Justin Roberts was our first attempt at working with local business underwriting and the distribution of free tickets to the Jonnycake Center and South County Community Action. It was another amazing night, with more than one hundred children and parents in attendance. Debby Hedison played a huge part in making this event the success that it was, along with tireless volunteers and committee members like Lisa McHenry and Tina Toomey.

Our Social Events committee is extremely dedi-

cated. It would be impossible to produce these shows without the help of Tina, Lisa, Eileen DeMaio, Pete Burton, Gabrielle Torphy, Elise Bender and Keith Ward. Harry and Ali Buffum leave the committee now after many years of service, but will remain "friends of the Social Events Committee." We can't thank them enough for everything they've done and continue to do

for UUCSC. And thanks to our dear friend Myron Waldman for his ideas and guidance.

This year, we have incredible shows lined up for every month beginning in September, with three bookings already for next year. The Narragansett Times had a very positive article about the series, and we were mentioned recently on the South Kingstown Patch website. Artists continually

remark about how special our sanctuary is as a performance space, and our audiences rave about the concert experiences we are offering, the intimacy of the space, the acoustics, the genuine community feeling that is present on concert nights.

All this being said, it is a consistent fact that UUCSC members don't turn out in force for these concerts. "Virtue can only flourish among equals." – Mary Wollstonecraft

Mary Wollstonecraft (1759-1797), British writer, philosopher, advocate of women's rights, and Unitarian, died 214 years ago this month. Best known as author of A Vindication of the Rights of Woman, she died at 38 after giving birth to her daughter Mary (wife of Percy Bysshe Shelley and author of Frankenstein).
